








Vaccination Coverage by Zone

Percent of children age 12-23 months with all basic vaccinations (BCG, measles, and 3 doses each of DPT and polio)





Currently almost 60% of children are anaemic. This is a remarkable decline since 2004-05 when more than 70% of children had at least some form of anaemia.




Trends in Vaccination Coverage




75% of children have received all of the recommended basic vaccinations. This is a slight improvement since 2004-05. Vaccination coverage ranges from 58% in Western Zone to 87% in Eastern Zone.

Almost 2 in 3 households owned an insecticide-treated net (ITN) in 2010, almost twice the proportion found in 2007-08. Children are also much more likely to be sleeping under an ITN.
